#### **Objectives and Activities**

#### Our Vision

To provide Mobility Dogs to everyone in New Zealand who would benefit from being partnered with one.

#### Purpose

To have a positive impact on the lives of people living with disability.

#### **Our Mission**

To enhance the lives of people living with long term disabilities by providing Mobility Dogs to increase independence, confidence, self-esteem and participation in New Zealand communities.

#### What We Do

We train service dogs to help people with disabilities to lead more independent lives.

We manage two prison programmes to support the rehabilitative goals of prisoners.

We manage four puppy raising communities in Auckland, Whangarei, Hamilton and Christchurch.

We train therapy dogs and their specialist handler to work in a clinical environment.

We continue to support our clients for the lifetime of their Mobility Dog.

We seek new ways that Mobility Dogs can help people.

We actively instigate, participate in and manage research.

#### Quality

Guided by our accreditation with Assistance Dogs International, we commit to achieving high standards and best practice together with ensuring the health and wellbeing of all of our dogs.

#### Collaboration

We work together with other organisations to advance our collective knowledge for the benefit of all New Zealanders.

#### **Funding**

We commit to spending funders money wisely through efficiency and focus.



#### Achievements, Performance and Impact

Since 2006 we have placed over 80 dogs, who have a life-changing impact on people living with disabilities. We have worked with 100's of prisoners to support their rehabilitative goals. This equates to 1,000's of lives positively impacted by our work.

During the 2018/19 financial year we supported, achieved and developed:

- Supported over 50 working partnerships and teams who have a range of disabilities including cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, spinal injury, Parkinson's to name a few.
- Supported and taught over 16 prisoners how to raise and train service dogs.
- Worked with two dental clinics with our Therapy Dogs.
- Managed a team of 34 puppy raising volunteers.
- Continue to instigate, manage and develop research opportunities to monitor our performance and impact on clients and their families.
- Developed a brand re-fresh which is underpinned by our tag line 'life changing loyalty'

#### Acknowledgements

We are grateful to our supporters, volunteers and funders. Many of our corporate sponsors including Mars NZ and Animates NZ have maintained their support for many years. Further, the Trust continues to be acknowledged and supported by the philanthropic community of New Zealand and for this we are sincerely appreciative. #### Legal name

Mobility Assistance Dogs Trust (the Trust).

#### Type of entity and legal basis

The Trust is a registered charity in New Zealand.

#### The Trust's mission

To enhance the lives of people living with disabilities, increasing independence, confidence, self-esteem and participation in New Zealand communities.

#### Structure of the Trust's operations, including governance arrangements

The Trust comprises a Board of 7 Trustees who oversees the governance of the Trust, a General Manager who is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Trust and reporting to the Trustees, and two full-time and two part-time staff who support the General Manager in delivering against the Trust's objectives.

#### Main sources of the Trust's cash and resources

The Trust's activities are primarily funded through donations and grants received from individual, corporate, trust and community funders. From time-to-time the Trust also undertakes fundraising activities.

#### The Trust's reliance on volunteers and donated goods or services

In partnership with the Department of Corrections, the Trust relies on the time of prisoner handlers who work with the Trust's staff to raise and train dogs as part of the Puppies-in-Prison programme. The Trust also receives food for all dogs in the Puppies-in-Prison programme from its corporate sponsor Mars New Zealand.

At times the Trust may also rely on gifts of volunteer time from its sponsors and the community to raise and socialise dogs as part of their training.

To Note: One placement was a Therapy Dog placed in a dental clinic to reduce anxiety for children.

Volunteer Puppy Raisers - Our team has worked closely with our clients and volunteer puppy raisers over the last year to ensure good outcomes for all our trainee Mobility Dogs aged from 8 weeks to 2+ years. We currently have teams of volunteer puppy raisers in Auckland, Hamilton, Whangarei and Southern Lakes.

Puppies in Prison- Our Canine team work at Auckland Region Women's Corrections Facility in Wiri and Spring Hill Corrections Facility on a weekly basis as part of our prison programme. We presently have a commitment from the two prisons to have 16 prisoners working on the programme at any time. Throughout the year new prisoners are inducted into the programme as others graduate or leave to other roles. This programme continues to be a key part of our service allowing us to achieve our primary goal of training Mobility Dogs. Currently 100% of our dogs in training are trained, in part, by prisoners on this programme. A secondary objective of the programme is that it provides skill development and pro-social outcomes for the prisoners.

Clients- We continue to support all of our current clients and have undertaken 38 public access assessment in this current financial year.

**Research**- As the Trust has grown, the need continues to be recognised for robust, quantitative measures to assess the outcomes of our service. The Trusts keen to evaluate how well it meet its mission statement and since 2014 we work with AUT University to implement two research projects to begin the process of assessing if service dogs enhance the lives of their clients.

IPA (The Impact on Participation and Autonomy Questionnaire)- was selected for implementation into practice at the Trust. The IPA is offered only to new clients of the Trust at the time of placement and then re-presented after a partnership has been in operation for one year. This last financial year 3 further IPA surveys were completed. The IPA is also proving an invaluable tool with which to understand where our successes lie, and whether there are areas of our service which require attention and improvement.

**CQLI (Caregiver Quality of Life)** Research - In October 2017 Mobility Dogs granted a scholarship to a Stage 4 Physio student to research the most appropriate measure to assess CQLI (care giver quality of life index) of the primary carer of our clients. This is because we believe that placing a dog with our clients also impacts on the quality of life of the primary carer. The primary carer completes a survey prior to





the person they are caring for receiving a Mobility Dog and then the Trust will reassess with a further survey one-year post placement. We have received 3 return surveys in this financial year.

Expanding our Service-The Trust recognises our future expansion lies in the expansion of our service. This year we placed a dog in a Dental Clinic. This is a Therapy Placement where the dog works primarily with anxious young patients.

### **Statement of Accounting Policies**

Mobility Assistance Dogs Trust (CC24410) For the year ended 31 March 2019

#### **BASIS OF PREPARATION**

The Trust has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting — Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Financial Statements are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Financial Statements are prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

#### **GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)**

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

#### **INCOME TAX**

The Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

#### BANK ACCOUNTS AND CASH

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short-term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

#### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Revenue

Donations, sponsorship and fundraising

Revenue from donations, sponsorship and fundraising are recognised when the funds are received.

Grants

Revenue from grants is recognised when the funds are applied to the relevant expense.

Placement fees

Revenue associated with the provision of trained dogs is recognised when an approved applicant's dog is ready for placement.

Interest revenue

Interest revenue is recorded as it is earned during the year.

**Employee related costs** 

Wages, salaries and annual leave are recorded as an expense as staff provide services and become entitled to wages, salaries and leave entitlements.

Performance payments are recorded when the employee is notified that the payment has been granted.

Superannuation contributions are recorded as an expense as staff provide services.

#### Debtors

Debtors are initially recorded at the amount owed. When it is likely the amount owed (or some portion) will not be collected, a provision for impairment is recognised and the loss is recorded as a bad debt expense.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is recorded at cost, less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses

Depreciation is provided on both a straight-line and diminishing value basis, with the associated deprecations rates of the major classes of assets and useful lives (where applicable) estimated as follows:

Computer Equipment

Straight-line, 2.5 years (40%)

Plant &Equipment

Straight-line, 3 to 6 years (17.5% to 30%)

**Motor Vehicles** 

Diminishing value at 20 to 30%

Creditors and accrued expenses

Creditors and accrued expenses are measured at the amount owed.

Employee costs payable

A liability for employee costs payable is recognised when an employee has earned the entitlement. These include salaries and wages accrued up to balance date and annual leave earned but not yet taken at balance date.

Tier 2 PBE Accounting Standards applied

The Trust has not applied any Tier 2 Accounting Standards in preparing its financial statements.

#### Report on the audit of the performance report

#### **Opinion**

In our opinion, the accompanying performance report of Mobility Assistance Dogs Trust (the 'trust') on pages 5 to 19:
